GPS NAVIGATION DEVICE

GPS navigation devices are finally here. In fact, they have had a presence in the local market by way of static and parallel imports. I count these devices as being imported, not because of their origin, but because of the data available to them. More specifically, the maps were imported from the US, as there was no official support from the respective manufacturers. It's a different story nowadays, as there are now GPS navigation gadgets that have local support and local support and you'd be hard-pressed to get lost with these things in your car. carNAVi is the latest manufacturer to jump into the local GPS navigation scene, and if there is one thing Pro BT is any indication, they're set to give their competitors a run for their money.

The Pro BT uses an internal GPS antenna and acquires a signal in less than two minutes. It has voice prompts which tell you to "take a turn" if you are to "turn right" or "left". One thing I liked about the display is that the environment is rendered in 3D, so you'll be able to see if you're passing by a building or a gas station. The display also dims automatically depending on the time of the day and when you go into a tunnel.

Like other solutions in the market, you'll be able to set your destination in different ways, mainly through points of interests (POI), address search and city search. You can even search for a place or what city the locations you're looking for though potentially slowing down searches when you're in a hurry. One thing that pleasantly surprised me is the large amount of POIs in the system. Of course, a product like the Pro BT is only as good as the quality of its maps, and I'm happy to say that it didn't disappoint. The maps are pretty accurate and up-to-date, and carNAVi assures me that they have maps of the whole country in some way or the other.

HTC WILDFIRE

SIMPLY

WON'T BURN YOUR WALLET

With three years now, HTC has managed to take the Android operating system to new heights. As previously mentioned, HTC has been a significant stumbling block to mass market penetration. The Wildfire is HTC's recent effort to penetrate the lucrative mid-range market. It has all the bells and whistles you expect from the "Asian-based" mobile phone maker, but with a gender.

The Wildfire looks like a cross between the HTC G1 and Desire. It inherited the curved glass looks and the optical track pad of the Desire while retaining touch-sensitive controls of the G1. Cool, sleek styling is standard fare, and if you're not a fan of the white and silver number that was sent to us for review, the Wildfire is available in three other colors—red, black and gray. The display is a 3.2-inch capacitive touch screen affair with 240 X 320 QVGA resolution.

Unsurprisingly, HTC has opted to equip the Wildfire with an MSM 7225 520 MHz processor to bring the unit's price down. That also means some of the more CPU-intensive applications and games might not run as smoothly as you'd expect. Speaking of Android, the Wildfire runs Google's v2.1 Eclair OS. While there's no official word on a 2.2 upgrade, it's more than likely it'll receive an update in the near future. As is the norm with HTC devices, the Wildfire is equipped with the Sense UI built on top of the OS which gives users additional home screens and widgets. Another HTC feature that will surely appreciate is Friend Stream, which basically a social networking aggregate that allows you to track Facebook, Twitter and Flickr updates quickly and easily.

Connecting to the web is quick and easy, and the Wildfire sports a browser with a 3G connection so you'll always be able to connect online wherever you want. One feature that I particularly like on Android 2.2 enabled smartphones is how they handle your contacts, especially ones in Facebook. If you don't have their phone numbers, you can still call your friends if their contact number is in their Facebook profile. You can now also recommend Android apps to your friends from the Wildfire which makes finding apps easier.

Of course HTC had to cut back on some of the features to lower the price. The Wildfire lacks a regular LCD screen as opposed to an AMOLED one on the Desire and Legend, and the difference really shows. Reading the screen of the Wildfire is like reading a blurry image from a distance. It's just not much of an issue while indoors. As mentioned before, applications that are graphically taxing noticeably chug with the Wildfire, due mainly to its slower CPU.
